In his book, *The Church of Irresistible Influence*, Robert Lewis tackles the issue of modern day churches and their lack of connections to the neighborhoods and people that live around them. Throughout the book he points out the fact that oftentimes churches are like islands. They are separate and cutoff from the rest of the world around them. Serving their own members and their own needs.

Lewis states that the church today needs to be a church that builds bridges. Bridges that, "Give life through two-way movement! Without its own bridges to the world, church life - in time - fades into isolation, self-congratulation, and finally, irrelevance." (pg. 31) How these bridges are built is a crucial component, I believe. They can't be built out of fear, guilt, or the idea that if they are built then flocks of people will come flooding into the church.

These bridges need to be built with humility. The heart of building them needs to be the heart of Jesus reaching the lost. Bill Hull describes the average evangelical church with these words, "Churches are preoccupied with themselves, their routines, facilities, and filling their buildings for performances." (pg. 29)

If bridges are built into the community with this idea being what is undergirding those bridges, then they will fall. The church must exist for the sake of the world. The bridges and connections that are established need to be rooted in love, suspended by the Great Commandment and the Great Commission.



I think Lewis has come up with a great analogy for us to use in evaluating how well the church is "bridging" the gap.

Too often our communities don't even know that the church exists, much less what it does.

And if they do know about the church, chances are it is not in a positive light. I know that I am convicted by this. I think building bridges needs to happen. And I think it is going to have to be a vision that is cast and nurtured by those in leadership within the church.

Building bridges does not happen overnight. These are connections that take time to create and foster. We must keep our focus on Jesus Christ and the fact that He is calling us to reach out on His behalf. Think about these following questions for MFCC:

- How does the community around you "know" your church? Do they feel a positive connection with it?
- 2. Could your church be accurately described as "a club"? If the answer is no, why not?
- 3. What changes in your church structure are critically needed?
